## Interview Questions

#### AIM:

obtain insight into the experiences of Global South Migrants in Finland

- Pulling Factors ( why did you decide to come to Finland considering the climate)?
- Preconceptions of Finland prior to arrival?
- Reality of being here / personal experiences?
- Are you an Open Muslim?
- Has being a Muslim in any way impacted your life here?
- Do you have any family here / Are you married?
- Are you gainfully employed?
- What are your experiences working with Finnish nationals?
- Do you feel you have been accepted as a non-Finn?
- What do you find hard about the Finnish Culture?

# Findings

#### **■** Finnish Experience

- Positive, Optimistic
- Speaks fluent Finnish
- 8 years in Finland
- Finds his skills are a benefit for BOTH Finland and Bangladesh
- Finds that Bangladeshi nationals have a positive overall acceptance in Finland because they are known for being positive contributors to the Finnish economy

#### ■ Religious Experience

- He has never experienced religious persecution
- Finds that Religious freedom is allowed

# Post Interview Experience

#### Interviewee:

- Was visibly relaxed during and after the interview
- He clearly appreciated the opportunity to share his experience
- He thanked us for the manner in which we conducted the interview
- Mentioned that he felt respected and was allowed to speak and even though we had our own questions he didn't feel controlled to respond in any particular way

#### ■ Interviewers:

- We found it interesting how nervous we both were before the interview and how relaxed we were after the interview
- We felt maybe being both Muslim had an impact on the interviewees "commitment" to his responses
- As the female interviewer at a mosque I was amazed how I felt compelled to "impose" my
  African perception of Muslim women in African mosques. I also felt very comfortable
  wearing scarf and it was interesting for me that it was a natural decision to wear a scarf
- I also think that it did contribute to the feel of the interview the interviewee made a
  point of making me know he respected me as a person and not as a Muslim women

## **Observation Report**

Place: Cafeteria Lozzi

■ Time: 17.45 - 18.15

■ Aim: to obtain an insight to people, and how they use their eating time at the student cafeteria and the overall atmosphere.

## Findings:

- Average queue time: 12.30 min
- Physical settings: 12 single person, 12 couples, 2 groups of three people, 5 groups of four+ people
- Ratio of people: Male- 36, Female -28

## Single Person's Activities:

- Reading Newspaper: 2 persons
- Browsing mobile: 6 Persons
- Eating: 3 persons
- Study: 1 person

## **Analysis:**

- Single people took less time to finish their meal.
- Increased number of customers just before closing.
- The cafeteria had multiple functions for the patrons

## **Comparison of Observation Process**

- Sat at the same table yet instinctively had different things we focussed on
- Intentionally chose a table at the rear end of the cafeteria to get a full view of the patrons
- We found our structure was different
- we DID NOT discuss any structure or our how we were going to individually do the observations

#### ■ Sifat

- Walked around had a specific focus to look at specific things (the time it took to get through the queue)
- Had a more "factual" approach focused on concrete things e.g. numbers, times

#### Berma

- chose to be more "invisible" and "blend" stayed at the table
- Looking for "softer" things (e.g. body language, single people vs groups)

## Post Observation

- We found our individual focus interesting
- Our combined data complimented the gab in our individual observations
- It gave the observation a more holistic view
- We also discussed that maybe our sex influenced how we approached the same observation
- Our inability to speak Finnish meant we had to focus on what saw / wanted to see
- Not discussing our observation approach proved useful - made us aware of our individual blind-spots in our personal observations
